

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
Traffic Safety Minutes:

The March meeting of the North Tonawanda traffic safety Committee was called to order at 1900 hours. Roll call showed the following members present: J. Sikora, A. Vater, R. Frank, and M. Lemke. The minutes from the previous meeting were read and accepted. The following new concerns were discussed and recommendations made.

1. The signal at the intersection of Oliver and Felton Streets was discussed. After a second month of monitoring the intersection the Committee recommends the Signal Department check the timing. It appears increasing the time of the green light for Oliver Street would help traffic flow. The Committee would like the timing of the signal at Oliver and Center checked also and makes the same recommendation for this intersection.
2. A request was received to look into making changes at the intersection of Main and Island Streets. This was discussed and will be further discussed at the April meeting when new Member Daigler is present.
3. Member Frank reported on parking along Zimmerman Street. A drawing will be presented at the April meeting with proposed changes to location of signs.
4. Nash Road resident Rick Bugman, 531-3050, contacted the Committee with concerns on truck traffic along Nash Road as well as the over all condition of the road. With the future opening of new Meadow Drive truck traffic on Nash may decrease and ease his concerns. As for the overall condition of the road this winter took a toll on all roads in North Tonawanda and with spring repairs approaching the condition of Nash Road should improve.

Meeting adjourned at 1945 hours.

My name is Josh Sligh; I am from troop 184 out of Saint Paul's. We will be hosting the Camporee in October and would like to use Gratwick Park as well as Fisherman's Park. The theme of the camporee is "Survivor". The group will be split in two; The first group will be the younger scouts, the second will be the older more experienced. We have a few questions regarding rules of the park and available locations.

The younger group of scout will be stationed at Gratwick Park where all of their events will take place. These events include lashings, knot tying, basic trapping, water purification, and useful camp gadgets. They will also compete against other troops. They will supply their own food as a troop and cook as a troop. We also would like to know about things like trash disposal and water use. Also, what sections of Gratwick can be camped upon?



We are pushing your comfort zone this weekend

Please read the following carefully!

This Survivor Camporee has a General Program and a Survivor Program each with its own Guide book. This is the Survivor Guide!

Our Scouts have been getting bored with many of the recent programs and took on the challenge of this event. Often the Troop with the “bigger” or “older” Scouts always wins the points. So we twisted the program a lot!

The Survivors must complete the application, a resume' so to speak, representing your Scouting Career and have it reviewed and approved within your Troop before you can play! Applicants will have to be: First Class, Star or Life rank. Applicants must have earned and can show the Blue Cards for ___ (12) of following 35 Merit Badges (Astronomy, Backpacking, Bird Study, Camping, Climbing, Communications, Cooking, Hiking, Emergency Preparedness, Energy, Engineering, Environmental Science, First Aid, Fish & Wildlife Management, Fishing, Forestry, Geocaching, Hiking, Insect Study, Kayaking, Mammal Study, Moviemaking, Orienteering, Personal Fitness, Photography, Pioneering, Railroading, Reptile & Amphibian Study, Safety, Search & Rescue, Space Exploration, Water Sports, Weather, White Water, Wilderness Survival).

Applicants must have presented LNT - Leave No Trace within their Unit or to a Cub Pack or Venturing Crew.

Applicants will complete the application and present these pre-requisites to their Scout Master, who “releases them to the Survivor Program”. These applicants have no requirement to their individual Unit for the weekend shortly after they arrive. The Survivor Program may allow them to visit during the weekend, but should not otherwise be counted on for the General Survivor Program. It is highly recommended that the Unit will return home with the applicant but the Unit is not counting on the applicant otherwise.

Applicants will do “the next level” of the skills learned and mastered in their Scouting career; we are challenging them well into the point of self-proficiency. Example: At one time they lashed a camp gadget, wrote a report, and described some stuff! Well this weekend that gadget and what he learned then will be needed to survive the rigors of this Survivor Program in real life use.

Oh and to make it “fun” they are not scheduled to sleep until we return them to you, Sunday morning! Sleep deprivation will rear its ugly head, tasks once thought to be simple will be challenging. [Maybe we will let them nap for four hours]

There will be a maximum number of (6) six applicants any Unit can approve and submit. These applicants will perform as a Patrol; however, no Scout who gets approved needs to wait for others to apply. We will mix applicants together from other Troops. So each applicant will be planning for himself and preparing to share his skills with similarly matched but potentially unfamiliar applicants from other Units, still performing as a Patrol!

I do have a need for supplemental adult supervision, specifically from those in your unit who work “third shift”, as they are nocturnal, familiar with the rigors of performing their day to day functions, however while everyone else is asleep.

Each night, the applicants will also need to plan and consume two extra meals not normally eaten, because you will need to keep your energy up to be, “mentally awake”. Additionally, voluntarily inviting and feeding those nocturnal adults will earn your Patrol extra points. Those adults can “choose” who to eat with because the other Patrol is offering or serving better food.

The applicants “suggested Packing List” will be different because you are one sixth of a patrol and some preplanning will be required. You and your new Patrol members must “be prepared”!

General Program Thoughts

The General Program campers in Gratwick Park also have to survive. Gratwick Park has No Trees for shade, nothing to hang your hammock or lantern or clothesline from, no flush toilets, only one water spigot, one pavilion, River Road on the East side and the Niagara River on the West side. General Program participants will also be sharing Gratwick Park with the general public, launching their boats, walking their dogs, enjoying the sunset. Additionally, everyone must abide by the rules of the City's park; the park is open to the public, so although we are Scouts we are accountable to other people.

Please pay attention to the suggested equipment additions in the appropriate portion of the Guide. The General program will be presented just like any other Camporee, introductory skill will be challenged and reinforced, and your younger scouts will still earn points and develop their Leadership skills. But this time the General Program participants will NOT have the “bigger kids in the way”! You still come to camp and set up the popup and erect their tents and cook your meals and lug water and clean dishes if that is what you choose. Sometimes I miss those days.

Fees and Registration

The Camporee committee requests preregistration to help determine supplies needed for this event. The participation fee is \$0.05 per Boy Scout & Leader.

There will NOT be a fee to those, Nocturnal adults – Thank you in advance for your skills!

BSA Registration

Youth - Each youth must be a registered Boy Scout or Venture Scout to participate in either General or Survivor Program.

Leaders - A minimum of two Registered Adult Leaders per Unit must be present in camp at all times. For this Survivor Camporee, you should be aware, we are running two Programs simultaneously, and I do have a need for an additional adult or two. I have a specific need for any registered, Youth Protection Trained adult who work "third shift" as this Survivor Program will run throughout both nights, continuously!

As normal - All Leaders in attendance must have current (within the past 24 months) Youth Protection Training.

- Consider extra points for the Applicants for every adult with current training – within two years of rechartering time!

Guests - Parents or others associated with a troop in attendance are encouraged to join the General Program on Saturday for the day of those activities. Any Guests are the responsibility of the Host Unit.

- Consider extra points for new Leader applications accepted by Professional GNFC staff at the Camporee before Religious services on Saturday!

Check-in Procedure

Units may check-in on Friday October 24th any time between 4:00 and 9:00 pm. at the Camporee headquarters (the only pavilion at Gratwick Park).

Completed Roster

A completed roster (Please print each name clearly), is available at the end of this document for the General Program and the Individual Applications for the Survivor applicants can be found there also. Any additional Camporee registration fees are due at the time of Check-In.

Unloading and equipment drop-off

If you are bringing a trailer, drop the trailer off at the designated location and park the tow vehicle separately, as quickly as possible. Please bring a lock for your hitch! All vehicles must be parked in the designated parking areas for the remainder of the weekend. Only Trailers may be left in the designated trailer areas!

Said another way, stuff your worldly possession into your trailer! Hand carry (or use a wagon) to carry whatever you want from your car to your campsite.

Camp sites

Units locations will be parallel to River Road and the Park road; leaving a very wide central aisle way. First arrivals will get First choice. Please if you are bringing a trailer drop the trailer off and park the tow vehicle separately, as quickly as possible. Said another way, stuff your worldly possession into your trailer only! Hand carries from the parking lot anything else you want to carry!

- Is there a North Tonawanda Liability Waiver included in this program guide signed by scout's guardian is required for all participants in this Camporee?

First Aid

A First Aid staff member will be available on-site at the Camporee.

All injuries must be reported in writing to the Camporee staff.

Please handle within your Unit the simple stuff, but report everything to the First Aid Staff as soon as practice. Submit a note with the Patients name, Patents Unit number, Description of the injury, time of the injury, how the injury was addresses, what time was the injury addressed, was it necessary to notify family? If you are notifying family – WE NEED TO KNOW NEXT!

Medical Form

It goes without saying; you bring every participant Medical Form to every camping experience. But every Survivor participant (not in the General Program) MUST have turned in a "copy" of their medical form. (So hang onto them after summer camp!) We are pushing their systems and IF needed we will need that information. Thank you for your understanding.

Medications

From the Guide to Safe Scouting - The taking of prescription medication is the responsibility of the individual taking the medication and/or that individual's parent or guardian. A leader, after obtaining all the necessary information, can agree to accept the responsibility of making sure a youth takes the necessary medication at the appropriate time, but BSA does not mandate or necessarily encourage the leader to do so. Also, if state laws are more limiting, they must be followed. BSA camp standards may modify this for specific camp operation.

Radio Communication

Family Radio Service (FRS) and General Radio Mobile Service (GMRS) radios are used by many throughout year. For this weekend you may bring and use you radios. We would like to reserve:

Channel 9 (no codes) for Emergency Traffic

Channel 3 (no codes) for General Camp Questions or Announcements

Channel 5 (no codes) for The Survivors program

If your Unit normally uses any of these channels, may we ask you to move (QSY) to another channel?
Thank you!

Security

Unit leaders are responsible for the security of their campsites at all times. Campsites should never be left unattended. So invite a few other Leaders to assist, there are several members in your Unit who want the job of “sit and drink coffee... here”. Visitors should present themselves to the adult in charge immediately upon entering the campsite.

The Venue

You are sharing a City public park with the rest of the planet, so play nice with everyone else. Defacing or damaging buildings or park equipment, cutting or hacking live trees is prohibited. Alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs, firearms, flares, sheath knives, bows and arrows are not permitted. Smoking is not permitted where Scouts may be present and only in areas the park allows. Local Park rules and Regulations will also be complied with.

Since this is a City park, with an epic water front we will follow the Park rules! Fishing and access to the waters' edge is available however as there never has been a Life Guard station present, swimming in NOT an option. There is a boat launch frequently used by WNY residence we will give it a generous 200' separation from our program!

Cooking, Food Handling, Sanitation Trash, Campfires, Camp Stoves

Cooking - An adult holding a current certification in Fuels Safety Orientation (formerly Liquid Fuels Training) must be present if you are cooking anything.

A properly rated fire extinguisher must be available in each campsite.

Food Handling – Bring coolers to help preserve your foods integrity until prepared for consumption. Practice proper food handling techniques while at camp. Serve properly prepared meals to any and all participants & guests, when appropriate.

Sanitation – As you look around you will see there is no flush toilets. (This is Survivor camp) Brown water (Gray water) must be handled as outlined in the rules for Leave No Trace camping in the fore country. Dumping dish clean-up water into the Storm sewer or the Niagara River will incur the penalties of the EPA and DEC when they catch you. All units will be expected to assist in keeping park area clean.

- Does the C of NT have a few barrels to collect dishwater but allow water to drain onto the planet?

Trash - All trash is to be carried out unless otherwise notified.

- I would like each unit to be issued a garbage tote for the weekend and after the Camporee be pulled to the edge of the park road for collection.

Campfires - Ground fires are not permitted. Only above ground fire pits may be used. Fires must be attended at all times. Firewood transported into the park must follow New York State Department of Environmental Conservation regulations. Details are available at

<http://www.dec.ny.gov/animals/28722.html>. It is the responsibility of each unit to dispose of ashes and grease properly. Flames are not allowed in tents.

Does the C of NT have a way to dispose of ashes from campfires?

Camp Stoves – will undoubtedly become an integral tool in the Survivor Program. Please select the devices you are familiar and comfortable with. You are experienced Scouts and have become familiar with a device, so bring it!

Friday & Saturday Leader's Meetings

NOT a part of the Survivor Program. Event evaluation forms will be provided, please return them before leaving the Camporee, your comments are very important to us.

Uniforms and Colors

The Field Uniform (Class "A") should be worn for opening & closing flag ceremony, and religious services.

Religious Services

Everyone is encouraged to attend the Catholic, Protestant or Interfaith service on Saturday evening after colors. Locations to be announced.



Equipment: Rope, 1/2 inch in diameter; pole or tree limb, at least 1 1/2 inches in diameter; plank, at least 6 inches wide, 2 inches thick; stick of any diameter; container with a handle.

Object: Using the plank, pole, stick, and length of rope, the patrol must retrieve the container, which is placed some distance from the "riverbank."

Rules:

1. The Scouts may use only the assigned materials and their bodies.
2. If a Scout steps into the "river," he must go back and try again.
3. Time penalties may be given when a player or any of the equipment touches the ground.

Scoring: The first patrol to retrieve the container wins.

Crossing the Alligator Pit Page 27

Equipment: For each patrol, three spars, 6 to 8 feet long; three 6-foot lashing ropes; four guy lines

Procedure: Mark the "alligator pit" on the ground; it should be 20 feet across and as wide as necessary to accommodate your patrols. The patrols line up on one side of the pit. On signal, they lash together a triangular "walker," using a shear lashing at the top and diagonal lashings for the crossbar. Near the top, they attach the four guy lines, using two half hitches. The patrol then *stands the walker upright* and one member climbs on the crossbar. One or two Scouts control each guy line and "walk" the walker across the pit by tipping it from side to side and moving it forward.

Scoring: The first patrol to finish wins. Note: This can be a timed contest if there aren't enough spars for all patrols. Active Fitness Whole troop


